Government Betting on SaaS

When it comes to SaaS and government, one hand is definitely feeding the other. And I mean that in the most constructive way possible.

On the government side, federal mandates are pushing agencies to move to the cloud if at all possible, citing cost and efficiency savings. The federal government last year instituted a "Cloud First" policy, requiring agencies to consider the cloud before other options. It requires using commercial cloud technologies where possible.

Although there are three basic flavors of cloud computing -- SaaS, IaaS, and PaaS -- the federal government is largely moving to SaaS in larger quantities. That makes a lot of sense, actually. While SaaS requires simply moving applications to the cloud, infrastructure as a service (IaaS) and platform as a service (PaaS) require more trust, and letting go of more control. SaaS is also a way to dip an agency's toes in the water without too much risk.

In terms of the types of SaaS, apps getting the most play in government tend to be those with less sensitive information -- apps like collaboration, CRM, and content and document management, according to a new study from 1105 Government Group. Those dealing with sensitive information, such as financial, health, or anything with personally identifiable information, were the least adopted.

There are many examples of SaaS use across government. The US Army's Experience Center uses a SaaS app to track recruitment, while the Federal Labor Relations Authority uses a SaaS app to monitor case activity. The Department of Health and Human Services has put out a request for proposals for a SaaS system to support data modeling and simulation involving health and healthcare, and the Interior Department is moving its 88,000 employees to cloud-based email. There are dozens or even hundreds more examples.

Vendors following suit

With the federal government clearly on board, it's not surprising that vendors are following suit, not only marketing their SaaS apps to government, but creating new, government-targeted offerings. BMC, for example, recently introduced a version of its Remedy OnDemand IT Service Management app for the public sector. That's no coincidence. There are government-specific offerings for virtually every type of SaaS app, from CRM to ERP.

With the federal government's push toward the cloud, and agencies' tendencies to choose SaaS as the low-hanging fruit that complies with those government mandates, it's fair to say that use of SaaS in government will go nowhere but up. For vendors, the opportunity is there, in spades. For government users, the choices will only get better. Even in a down economy, this is a development worth betting on.
